<p><b>Dear Zoo: A Lift the Flap Book</b></p>		<p>Rod Campbell (2007)</p>	<p>The boy writes to the zoo, because they want a pet... Hilarity ensues as the crates start arriving, and the kid ends up having to send the animals back. (12 months -3 years old)</p>




<p><b>A sick day for Amos McGee</b></p>		<p><b>Philip C. Stead, Erin E. Stead (2010)</b></p>	<p>Friends come in all sorts of shapes and sizes. In Amos McGee's case, all sorts of species, too! Every day he spends a little bit of time with each of his friends at the zoo, running races with the tortoise, keeping the shy penguin company, and even reading bedtime stories to the owl. But when Amos is too sick to make it to the zoo, his animal friends decide it's time they returned the favor. (Age 2-6 years old)</p>
<p><b>Polar Bear, Polar Bear, What do you Hear?</b></p>		<p><b>Bill Martin Jr Eric Carle (2012)</b></p>	<p>The children will make the sounds the animals make. And they'll pretend to be the zoo animals (3-6 years old)</p>
<p><b>Color Zoo</b></p>		<p><b>Lois Ehlert (1989)</b></p>	<p>Shapes and colors in your zoo, lots of things that you can do. Heads and ears, beaks and snouts, that's what animals are all about. I know animals and you do too; make some new ones for your zoo. (Age 3-7 years old)</p>





All the while, they can search for Curious George, who is hiding on each page: "Is George around to see?" (2-4 years old)</p>
<p><b>The Zebra said shhh</b></p>		<p>M/R Nelson Tamia Sheldon (2013)</p>	<p>An exhausted zebra is ready for bed but the other animals at the zoo still want to play. Help the Zebra say "Shh" to the lions, elephants and other noisy animals at the zoo. (3-5 years old)</p>
<p><b>Good Night Gorilla</b></p>		<p>Peggy Rathmann (1996)</p>	<p>The weary watchman as he walks by the gorilla cage on his nightly rounds at the zoo. The gorilla answers by quietly pickpocketing the guard's keys, stealthily trailing him, and unlocking the cages of every animal the oblivious fellow bids goodnight to. Looking much like an exhausted father, the uniformed guard traipses home toward his cottage, while the lonely zoo animals softly parade behind him. (Age 2-6 years old)</p>





Gradually, public pressure built until a better way of life for Ivan was found at Zoo Atlanta. From the Congo to America, and from a local business attraction to a national symbol of animal welfare, Ivan the Shopping Mall Gorilla traveled an astonishing distance in miles and in impact. (Age 4-8 years old)</p>




<p><b>Zoo</b></p>		<p><b>Gail Gibbons (1991)</b></p>	<p>Before the zoo opens each day a small army of keepers, vendors, and maintenance workers perform the daily tasks of cleaning and setting up. Then the crowds flock in. . (Age 3-6 years old)</p>
<p><b>Bizzy Bear Zookeeper</b></p>		<p><b>Nosy Crow, Benji Davies (2015)</b></p>	<p>Bizzy Bear's spending the day at the zoo scrubbing the crocodile, brushing the hippo's teeth, and feeding the penguins. Readers will enjoy interacting with the story by pushing and pulling the tabs to help Bizzy Bear care for the animals. (Age 2-5 years old)</p>
<p><b>The mixed up chameleon</b></p>		<p><b>Erick Carle (1988)</b></p>	<p>Except for catching flies and changing colors occasionally, this chameleon doesn't find life very exciting. When a surprise visit to the zoo makes this wistful lizard realize it can change its shape and size as easily as its color, it ends up wanting to be like all the animals in the zoo at once--with hilarious results. (Age 3-6 years old)</p>

<p><b>Life Size Zoo</b></p>		<p>Teruyuki Komiya Kristin Earhart (2009)</p>	<p>An elephant's trunk is so nimble, it can pick up a single blade of grass, and yet so strong, it can knock over a tree. Giraffes have eyelashes. Sloths hang from trees for days at a time without going to the bathroom. These are just some of the insights featured in Life-Size Zoo. (Age 4-8 years old)</p>
<p><b>Peek a Zoo</b></p>		<p>Nina Laden (2014)</p>	<p>Read the clue . . . guess the animal . . . giggle wildly . . . and repeat! (Age 2- 4 years old)</p>
<p><b>Wild About Books</b></p>		<p>Judy Sierra Marc Brown (2004)</p>	<p>In this rollicking rhymed story, Molly introduces birds and beasts to this new something called reading. <p><b>Zoe's trip to the Zoo</b></p>		<p><b>Nirit Littaney</b></p>	<p>After reading plenty of animal books for kids, Zoe's parents finally take her to see all the creatures she loves so much. As they walk through the vividly illustrated zoo, her parents teach her interesting facts about all the different animals she sees. Follow Zoe through her trip to learn about your own jungle-dwelling favorites in this picture book for kids. (Age 3-8 years old)</p>
<p><b>Lt's Go to the Zoo</b></p>		<p><b>Fisher Price Ellen Weiss (2011)</b></p>	<p>Packed with flaps, <i>Let's Go to the Zoo!</i> Brings learning to this favorite Little People location. Eddie, Sarah Lynn, and all their friends discover colors, animal sounds, counting, and more as they enjoy a trip to the town zoo. (2-4 years old)</p>

<p><b>Curious George Goest to the Zoo</b></p>		<p>H.A rey</p>	<p>George is going to visit a new kind of zoo where the animals all roam free. Some of those animals look like a lot of fun—so much fun that a curious monkey can't resist joining them. Giraffes and flamingos are close enough to touch, but George befriends a baby rhino who seems a little sad. Who better to lure her from her hiding place than George? And just in time for her special birthday party! (Age 4-7 years old)</p>

<p><b>My Heart is like a Zoo</b></p>		<p>Michael Hall (2009)</p>	<p>For each feeling, the bold, graphic artwork creates an animal out of heart shapes, from "eager as a beaver" to "angry as a bear" to "thoughtful as an owl." An accessible and beautiful debut, My Heart Is Like a Zoo is everything a classic picture book should be: honest, sincere, and speaking directly to even the very youngest child. (Age 1-5 years old)</p>
