
Miss Spider's tea party


Very quiet cricket


Sitting in my box

The box gets more and more crowded until a hungry flea comes along (Age 2-6 years old)


Itsy bitsy spider


Gotcha


I love bugs


Ant, ant, ant

An ant and 59 other American insects appear in a catchy chant that jumps, flits, and flies across flashy spreads. (Age 5 -8 years old)


The Grouchy Ladybug


Old black fly


Bumble bugs and Elephants

Opposite pairs are presented in rhythmic text, with font sizes that grow larger and smaller (2-5 years old)


The Crunching Munching Caterpillar


Diary of a worm

This is the diary . . . of a worm. Surprisingly, a worm not that different from you or me. Except he eats his homework. Oh, and his head looks a lot like his rear end.


Superworm


The very ugly bug



Photographs and simple text describe the many things that insects do. (Age 3-6 years old)


10 Little caterpillars

Ten little caterpillars are out and about in our big, wide world--come join them! You never know what you might find. . . . A butterfly, perhaps? (Age 3-5 years old)


The very lonely firefly


The very lazy ladybug




The Icky bug Alphabet book
